What is it?

- Extensive reading/listening project
- In-class session / relaxed café-like atmosphere
- Students share information
- Complete package
- >2 years at Macquarie University English Language Centre, Sydney, AUS
- 2 awards from English Australia
- Data shows that it works
- Easily transferred

Ingredients for Reading

Voluntary Reading (outside class)

Learner autonomy

Follow-up activities (in class)

Online reading resources

Relaxed/fun atmosphere (biscuits, music)



Phase 1: Extensive Reading

Week 1

Set-up

Introduce:

- Book Club Café
- Websites for reading
- Reading logs
- Importance of reading

Week 1-5

Reading

Students

- Read outside class time
- Choose their own texts
- Record information to share

Week 2-5

Book Club Café (1hr/wk class time)

Students

- Share information (groups of 3-4)
- Enjoy a relaxed and fun atmosphere
- See immediate benefits of reading









Phase 2: Introducing Listening

What are the challenges our students face when listening in English?

- Speed (too fast)
- Processing in real time
- Connected speech
- Accents
- Lack of specific vocabulary
- No visual clues



Phase 2: Why blend listening with reading?

Overall aim Accuracy Fluency

Specific purpose Answer question Information/Enjoyment

Focus Words/Pronunciation Meaning

Materials Teacher chooses Student chooses

Amount Not much A lot


Speed May be uncomfortable Should be comfortable

Sugar in hot drinks - level 2



Level 3



Analysis showed how much sugar is in hot drinks. An example is that a can of coke has an average of 9 teaspoons of sugar, but that's nothing compared to Caffe Nero's Latte with 13 teaspoons of sugar. A Costa Chai Latte has 20 teaspoons of sugar, and the worst offender is a Starbucks's hot mulled fruit drink with 25

teaspoons of sugar. That is three times more sugar than you should have in one day!

Most sugar is in mochas and lattes. Costa and Starbucks say that they want to reduce the sugar in these drinks, but for now, it may be better for you to choose drinks with less sugar.
